

Current Development in Arctic Law

Authors' guidelines

Formatting

- The article should be submitted in Word format.
- When submitting the article, all authors' names, institutions, and email addresses should be included on the first page. The corresponding author should be marked with an asterisk (*)
- The article length should ideally be a maximum of 3000 words (although a longer article is accepted), including the title, main body, tables, figures, and references.
- The article must use Times New Roman, 12-point font, with single-line spacing.
- The margin on all sides (top, bottom, left, and right) should be 2 cm.

Chapters and sections

- Chapter headings should be **bold**, and not numbered (e.g., do not use "1.1").
- Subsections within chapters should be written in *italics* and not numbered (e.g., do not use "1.1.1").
- The first paragraph of each section should start without an indent. Indentation should be used from the second paragraph onward.
- One blank line should be placed between paragraphs.

Figures and tables

Figures

All figures must be numbered and include a heading. The heading should be placed below the figure. Example:

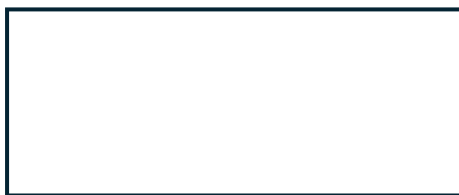


Figure 1. Figure title

Tables

Tables must be numbered and include a heading. The heading should be placed above the tables. Example:

Table 1. Table title

Citations

Authors must follow the referencing style described in the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA, 7th edition). Since the examples given below are very limited, please check and follow [APA Style](#) for other types of references.

In-text citation

- You must include the author and year in every in-text citation.
- If a work or an article has two authors, include both last names in the parenthetical reference and separate them by an ampersand (&), for example: (Salminen & Hossain, 2018).
- When you mention two authors as part of the text, separate them with the word “and” instead of an ampersand: Salminen and Hossain (2018) argued.....
- If there are three or more authors, write only the first author's last name followed by “et al.” right from the start, e.g., (Koivurova et al., 2015)

List of references

Each in-text reference must be entered into the reference list at the end of the article. The heading of the reference list should be “References”.

- Articles: The reference list must always show the author's last name and first name initials, the publication year in parentheses, the title of the article, and the name and volume of the journal.

Author, A. A., Author, B. B., & Author, C. C. (Year). Title of article. *Title of Periodical*, volume number (issue number), pages. <https://doi.org/xx.xxx/yyyy>

- Books: The reference list includes the author’s last name and first name initial(s), the publication year in parentheses, the title of the book, and the publisher. Italicize the title of the book.

Author, A. A. (Year of publication). *Title of work: Capital letter also for subtitles*. Publisher Name. DOI (if available)

- If the resource was written by a group or organization, use the name of the group/organization as the author. Additionally, if the author and site name are the same, omit the site name from the citation.

Group name. (Year, Month Date). *Title of page*. Site Name. URL
